- **Political Blowback:** There's precedent for allies and donors being pressured to conform, and even threatened with being labeled as “defectors” or opponents if their support is deemed insufficient or misaligned^[4].

Would All Billionaires Be Deterred?

Yet the heightened partisanship and aggressive stance toward media makes the prospect of a high-profile public media donation more fraught than in previous eras.
